available to devote to his job as the chairman of the Provincial Emergency Radio Advisory Committee (PERAC).



Sound Card Packet

You can use the sound card in your computer as a TNC to operate on Packet. A link to the software is available in the links section on www.percs.bc.ca.

Battery Desulfator

You can extend the life of a lead-acid battery by installing a desulfator on it. This circuit runs from the battery and generates high-current pulses that break up



sulfate crystals. Desulfators are vailable commercially or you can do what I did and build your own from an article that was published in Home Power Magazine. It would be a good idea to have one on your epeater battery, camper battery, 1 of course the battery that you

have in your home for power black-outs.
